

PAIRING CHART

A Scent for Every Room

Where each family works hardest, and where it fights you.

Scent behaves differently depending on the room it sits in. Warm rooms carry it further, damp rooms hold it longer, kitchens compete with it. This is our cheat sheet.

ROOM BY ROOM

Entryway Citrus and green notes. Bright, quick, sets the tone before anyone takes a coat off.

Living room Amber, fig and cedar. Warm enough to hold a room through an evening.

Kitchen Herbs and citrus. Sage, rosemary and bergamot cut through cooking rather than mixing with it.

Bedroom Lavender, linen, soft musk. Quiet enough to sleep beside.

Bathroom Eucalyptus and mint. Steam lifts them beautifully.

Study Cedar, vetiver, black tea. Grounding, not sleepy.

THREE SMALL RULES

- ☐ One scent per open space. Two competing bouquets read as neither.
- ☐ Match the season, not the calendar. Fig in January is lovely if the room is dark.
- ☐ Give your nose a break. If you cannot smell it any more, others still can.

Print it, stick it inside a cupboard door, and stop guessing.
